Mrs. Kitchin Is Hostess To Club

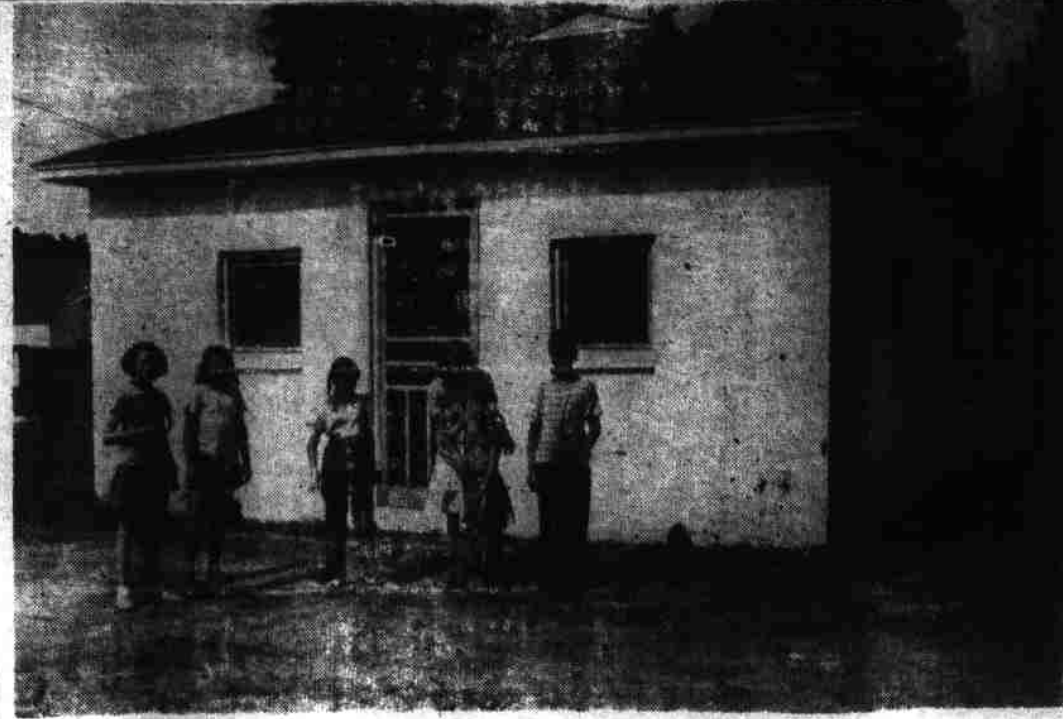
