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

Raleigh, July 28. - A motion that the State Department of Agriculture continue its policy of banning the sale of medicated poultry feeds in North Carolina was adopted unanimously at a public hearing recently attended by feed manufac-

turers, poultrymen, hatchery operators and specialists. North Carolina is the only State prohibiting the sale of medicated feeds. The hearing was called after some agitation for the removal of the ban had come from out-of-state

feed manufacturers. With most of those present expressing their views, the concensus was that marketing of medicated feeds in this State would make feed costs prohibitive, put poultry flocks in danger from amateur diagnosis and result in less attention to sanitation and sound management.
