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Texas Lawyers Hear Parker

J. R. O'Daniel, native of Duplin and now a practicing attorney of Fort Worth, Texas, sent the Times a clipping from the Dallas Morning News of Dallas, Texas. The clipping is a report by Richard M. Morehead of an address by Judge John J. Parker of Charlotte before the Texas State Bar Association. The report in part is as follows:

"Democracy can survive only by improving administration of justice by the courts, Judge John J. Parker of Charlotte, N. C., told Texas lawyers here Friday. Parker, a United States circuit judge, spoke to more than 500 persons at a luncheon in Hotel Adolphus for appellate and district judges, held in connection with the Texas State Bar convention. 1200 lawyers are attending the eighth annual convention, with meetings in the Adolphus and Baker Hotels. Reviewing the American Bar Association's campaign for improvement of the administration of justice, Judge Parker said:

"Democracy today is threatened by ideologies. If democracy is to survive in a contest with totalitarianism, democracy must be more efficient. Nowhere is efficiency more important than in the administration of justice. If we want to see our way of life survive, we've got to make administrations of justice more efficient."

Judge Parker contended that the government administrative agencies reflect public impatience with the courts. "There is a contest under way between government regulation and some form of collectivism," Parker said. "Administrative agencies are here to stay. People will not submit to economic tyranny."

Parker suggested that lawyers seek to have administrative agencies follow sound procedure rather than trying to oppose everything bureaucratic. "People Not Satisfied. The lawyer has to bring his business up to date," Parker declared. "If you think people are satisfied with the administration of justice, you're fooling yourselves." Judge Parker insisted that better jurors and better handling of juries are essential, too. "Too many times we put in the jury box men we wouldn't possibly entrust with any other serious business," Parker said. "A citizen ought

Dr. Udvarnoki At Warsaw Church

Dr. Bela Udvarnoki, President of the Baptist Seminary in Budapest, Hungary, was guest speaker in the Warsaw Baptist Church Sunday night. Dr. Udvarnoki, a native Hungarian, came to the States in June, accompanied by his two sons, and was married on July 5 to Miss Ruby Daniels, of Oxford, a former Southern Baptist missionary to Hungary and Africa.

Dr. Udvarnoki, who went to the Louisville Seminary in 1939, after introduction by the pastor, Rev. G. Van Stephens, began by saying, "I cannot speak pleasant things tonight. No one can who comes from Europe today." He said the people of Hungary have experienced so many tragic things and today Hungary is in ruins. In the past two years railroads have had to be rebuilt as are many public buildings, which were ruined during the war. He described very vividly the seven weeks siege of Budapest in 1944, how there was no safety for the people. The people found refuge in basements, which were not always secure. He told how a bomb blast destroyed the school and his apartment and of the tragic death of his wife and eight months old daughter. Today the people are heavily taxed, prices are even higher than here and it is a miracle how the people live.

Dr. Udvarnoki said there is a fine group of Baptist in Hungary and they all come to services held

in the 600 places of worship every Sunday. The members are missionaries and laymen serve as preachers. He said the best services are at night and the people are sacrificing people, giving five times as much as Americans. He said, "To be a Baptist in Hungary really means something, it means sacrificing and really costs."

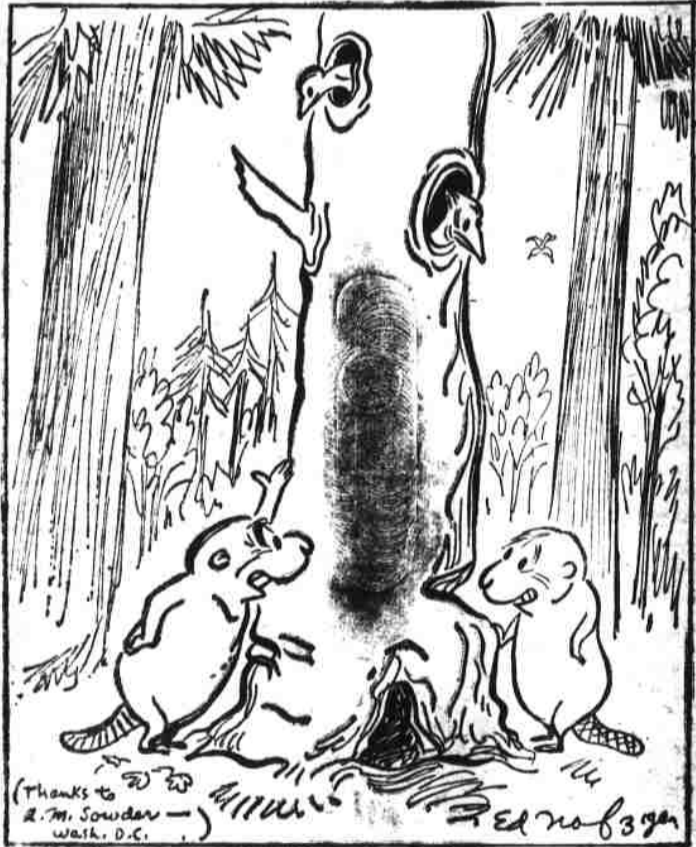
He asked the question, "Are the people of Hungary worthy of your interest?" He said we must look upon Europe as a missionary field, the most important field today. He said some say Europe has Christianity, but what kind of Christianity is there in Europe? They have heathen philosophy, plenty of scientists, and culture; but look to America as center of influence and life from the West instead of as in former times when it was East. He said Christ and the gospel is the only hope to get Europe together and that one hope for the world is to have more Baptist churches in Europe.

Asked "what can we do," Dr. Udvarnoki said, "accept Him, Christ needs your trust as well as courtesy. American churches need faith." He added that we need to strengthen our churches, pray and sacrifice that the people of Europe are looking toward America for help. He concluded with the question, "how much would you give for peace?"

Immediately following the service an informal fellowship hour was enjoyed in the ladies parlor. A special collection was taken for Dr. and Mrs. Udvarnoki and they were presented a check of \$101.00 from the Warsaw church and the Goldsboro delegation presented them \$50.00
