W. Herbert Jones, proprietor of the W. H. Jones Company in Pink Hill is not only a farmers merchant but a farmers tobacconist. He will sell you merchandise throughout the year and sell your tobacco for the high dollar in the fall to enable you to pay for that merchandise.

Herbert is the son of the late W. W. Jones of the Moss Hill section of Lenoir County. In his younger days Herbert spent much of his time in and around Seven Springs. In the fall he would pin hook tobacco. He learned tobacco on the farm and in the warehouse.

Seventeen years ago he entered the general merchandise business in Pink Hill and through his shrewd management has built the W. H. Jones company into one of the largest farm and home supply businesses in this section.

Last year Herbert bought and operated the New Carolina Warehouse in Kinston. He is also partner and manager of the Jenkins-Jones-Ford Agency in Kinston. Last spring he bought the Eagle Warehouse, one of the oldest and best known houses in Kinston.

This season Herbert will personally manage the New Carolina assisted by Jimmy Johnson of Pink Hill. The Eagle Warehouse will be managed by C. Kersey Smith, one of the most capable and best known tobacconists in Kinston. Kersey will be assisted by Floyd B. Jones, brother of Herbert. Incidentally, Kersey owns the Smith Concrete Products Co.,

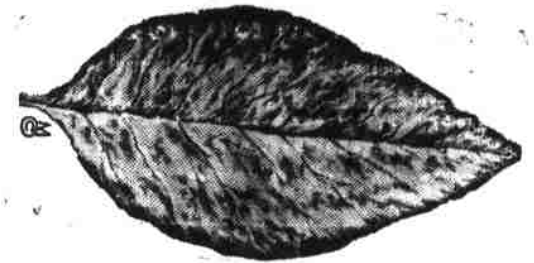
