For instance, if you use the potent weed killer, 2, 4-D, you must be as careful as an electrician on a rainy day. Nearly all plants can be killed with it, and unless you're watchful, you'll knock out your cotton along with your dandelions.

You have to know, for instance, that even the drainage water from treated areas can kill valuable plants, and spray residue left in the sprayer can likewise get out of hand.

I have learned that while 2,4-D is not poisonous to man or livestock it affects the soil for as long as 2 months after it has been sprayed.

You won't sink in any farther than your waist, he said.

Rutledge, professor of civil engineering at Northwestern University's Technological Institute, said the idea that quicksand swallows persons whole is just a myth for use by writers of adventure stories and horror movies.

"Civil engineers have known for years that there isn't a place in the world where a person will sink from sight in quicksand," Rutledge said, "but the public has been led to believe that once a person gets stuck in the sand and water mixture he is doomed."

Rutledge explained that a person can't sink deeper than his waist in quicksand, because sand and water have a specific gravity of between 1.8 and 2, while humans have a specific gravity of .98.

"The frightening thing about being stuck in quicksand is the restriction of movement," he said, "but there's no reason for panic. Anyone who gets foot on quicksand can get stuck in the mixture, he said, and just about anyone in such a predicament can free himself by swimming through the morass.

"It's best," he added, "to have a companion along to assist."
