Millions of my nieces and nephews are increasing their take-home pay by the simple, automatic Payroll Savings Plan. Let's take one example. 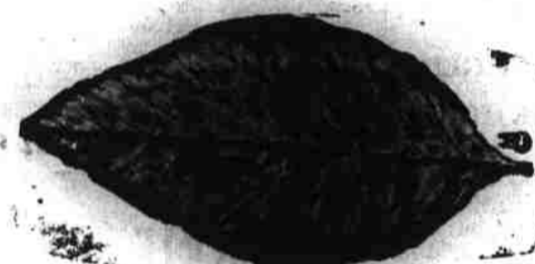
