

14 Year Old Deep Run Boy Dies From Injuries Near Cherry Point

Milton Everett Nobles, 14-year-old son of Mr. and Mrs. John W. Nobles of Deep Run, died in the hospital at the Cherry Point Marine Air Station around midnight Saturday from injuries suffered in a collision near the air base on September 7.

Young Nobles was a passenger in an automobile containing five other persons, which collided with one driven by Wiley B. Rogerson, fire chief of Robersonville.

Accompanying Nobles were Shirley Seymour of near Grifton, who is in a Kinston hospital with a fractured hip; Clayton Stroud of Deep Run, who recently was dismissed from a Kinston hospital with a fractured neck vertebrae; and Edward Stroud of Deep Run, a patient in Morehead City Hospital with critical injuries. The two others were Clifton Nobles of Deep Run, who received minor injuries, and a Parker girl of Deep Run, who was not seriously hurt.

The Robersonville fire chief was not seriously hurt, it was reported. Funeral services for the Nobles youth were held Monday at 4 p. m. from the home of his brother, J. B. Nobles of Deep Run, with whom he resided. Interment was in the Nobles cemetery near Nobles Cross Roads. The Rev. S. A. Smith, Free Will Baptist minister of Beaufort officiated.

Survivors include two brothers, J. B. Nobles of Deep Run and Lynnwood Nobles of Kinston; and three sisters, Mrs. Murray Rouse of Kinston, RFD, and Bonnie Lou and Jean Nobles, both of Deep Run.

To Visit Schools Here

A campaign of education on forest thinning for pulpwood and saw logs will be pushed here beginning after schools open by H. W. Hicks, newly appointed Chief Forester of the Southern States Forestry Commission, Inc., who is scheduled to come here later in the year to arrange for distribution of education material on timber conservation thru the teachers of this section. The material including posters, booklets, 16 mm sound technical films, and wild life charts are contributed by a group of six agencies who are financed to help prevent waste destruction of young timber by clearing off for any purpose, and also to encourage more care in fire prevention during the dry Fall, Winter and Spring season.

The exact time of Mr. Hicks tour here will be announced later, it is stated in a bulletin sent out from the Commission office in Birmingham, Ala.

The visitor holds a Master's Degree, Yale University Forestry School, and before coming with the Commission was with the U. S. Forest Experiment Station in Asheville, N. C.

Prior to going with the U. S. Forest Service, he was Assistant Manager of the White River Game Refuge, Stuttgart, Arkansas, later taking the same position with the Oconee Swamp Refuge, Waycross, Ga.

Better Farming For Better Living Year Draws To Close

Approximately \$1200 has been provided in prizes for winners which will be selected by the county councils which sponsors the county program. Awards will be made at special meetings in which all members of families participating will be invited.

Neil Bolton, Agricultural Agent for the Tide Water Power Company has been assisting with the program in each county. Bolton has visited 270 of the 350 enrollees and expects to see all enrolled prior to November 1.
