When a worker is 65, he should call at the office for information and advice. When a worker dies, someone in the family should inquire about Social Security at once and the survivors of veterans of World War II who have died since their discharge should inquire for information regarding possible benefits.

A representative of the SSA will be in Warsaw at 3 p. m. on the third Tuesday of each month at the Post Office to serve the people of this area.
