## Southern Farm Market Summary

Continued heavy fall marketings of cattle and calves pushed prices sharply lower this week but a demand in the Ga.-Fla.-Ala., direct marketing area kept prices steady.

Declines were from 50 cents to \$8 per hundred pounds.

Hog arrivals increased with closing tops up to \$27.50 at some markets.

Broiler prices weakened with losses of 2 to 4 cents a pound.

Egg prices held at high levels. Nearby produced eggs sold direct to retailers in Atlanta at 70 to 75 cents a dozen. Raleigh grading stations were 62 cents.
