LIGHTS, HORN, BRAKES, STEERING, MUFFLER, TAIL PIPE, TIRES, WINDSHIELD WIPER, WIRING AND CLEAR GLASS IN ALL WINDOWS.

THE FOLLOWING STICKERS WILL BE USED TO GRADE YOUR CAR:

Sticker No. 1

The bright blue approval seal, will be affixed to the windshield of all vehicles which pass the minimum requirements.

Sticker No. 2

A red and diamond shape, will be on vehicles which fail to meet the minimum safety requirements. (Owners of cars which the red-diamond sticker is affixed will have a certain length of time in which to have their vehicles placed in good repair, at which time it may be re-examined without additional cost.)

Sticker No. 3

An 8 by 10 inch, yellow sticker, bearing a red cross, will gon on vehicles found to be absolutely unsafe for the highways. Such vehicles will be labelled CONDEMNED, and cannot be driven away from the inspection stations.
