### Questions And Answers OF INTEREST TO VETS

Q. What veterans have preference to VA hospital beds?

A. Those suffering from service-connected disabilities and those requiring emergency treatment.  
Q. Am I eligible to benefits under Public Law 16 if I was discharged for a service-connected disability before I had served 90 days?  
A. Yes.  
Q. May a veteran receiving disability compensation, receive at the same time subsistence allowance?  
A. Yes.  
Q. I received an overpayment in subsistence allowance after I left school. Will I have to refund it?  
A. Yes.  
Q. How do I apply for hospitalization for a service-connected disability?

A. See your nearest VA Contact Officer.  
Q. I became blind while in service during World War II. Am I entitled to receive a guide dog at Government expense?  
A. Yes.

Q. What veterans are eligible to have prescriptions filled at no cost?  
A. If the veteran's physician has been authorized by the VA to treat the veteran, VA will pay for the prescription if it is used in the treatment of a service-connected disability.
