At the ame time, the Committee has sponsored clinical investigations which furnish better understanding of the progress and prognosis of different forms of tuberculosis and related conditions which offer difficulty in diagnosis.

These investigations are often of a highly technical nature and, beause of their complexity, proceed slowly. The chief reason for their continuation is the hope that vulnerable points will be discovered in the life processes of the tubercle bacillus, which will enable trained investigators to suggest means of such drugs as streptomycin act.
