Answers Timely
Farm Questions

Q. How can I treat pruning
wounds in my orchard?
A. Pruning wounds will heal
most quickly when made close.
Avoid leaving stubs which will
eventually rot. It is not necessary
to cover wounds of two inches or
less with protective material. When
larger wounds are made it is ad-
visable to cover them with a prep-
aration of pure white lead and lin-
seed oil. Grafting wax may also
be used.

Q. Will Benzene Hexachloride be
recommended for cotton insect
control this year?
A. Yes. It is one of the new or-
ganic insecticides and has been
used successfully against the boll
weevil, cotton aphid, leafworm,
fleahopper, thrips, tarnished plant
bug, and rapid plant bug.
