Long-Ago Look for Brides

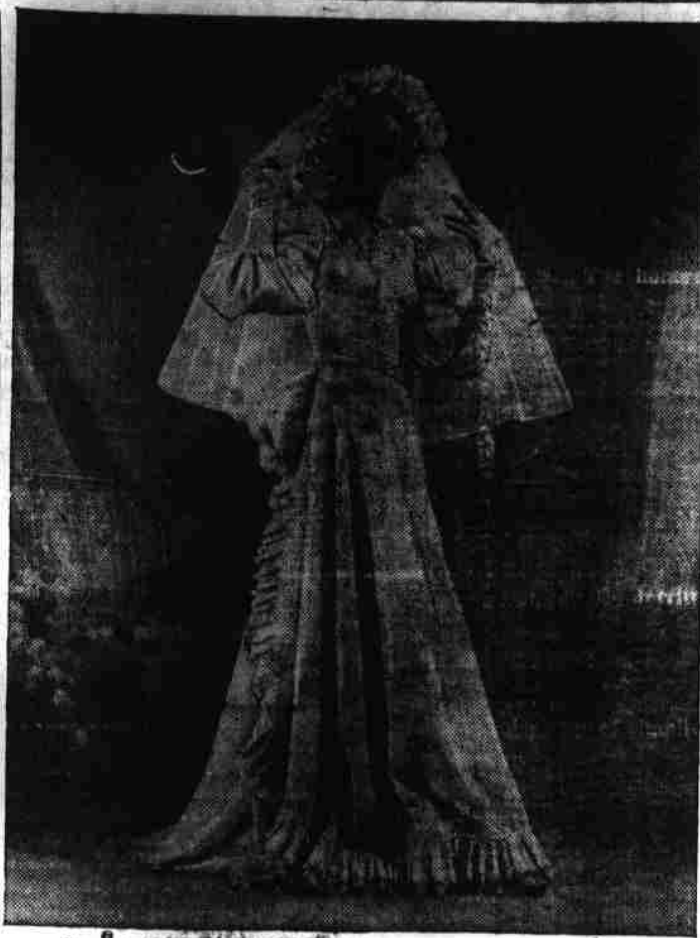
