Youth Caravan In Kenansville

Sunday evening, as darkness filtered in upon our little town, music rose heavenward from the grounds of Grove Presbyterian Church -- youthful voices united in singing the great hymns of the Church -- and with such a worshipful atmosphere the first night of the Caravan program came to an inspiring close.
 The revitalizing experience of that first night is being repeated again and again as the young people of Kenansville gather nightly to participate in the program led by the Presbyterian Caravan. This group of talented and well-trained leaders work under the direction of Miss Sara Little, Assistant Regional Director, Synod of North Carolina. In addition to Miss Little, the Caravan team consists of Miss Sara McNair of Charlotte, Miss Iris Bost of Concord, Mr. Milton Clessour of Charlotte, and Mr. Charles Elliot of Hickory. Each of these young people is trained in a particular aspect of the youth program and each evening conducts a discussion group in his or her special field.
 The evening program of Worship, Discussion, and Play is for those young people between the ages, 15 and 23. Each morning at 9:00 o'clock sessions are held for those between 16 and 15. Any young person who has missed the opening nights or mornings of this Caravan program is welcome to take advantage of the closing services.
 On Friday evening the activities of the week will culminate in a Consecration Service at which time

each young person will be urged to rededicate himself to the Christian way of life.
 Saturday morning the Caravanners will bid us farewell as they go on to work with young people in other towns throughout the summer. Our youth are fortunate to have the opportunity of sharing in this well-balanced program and of enjoying the valuable association with the members of the Caravan team.
