Hunters Urged To Practice Safety

When you're hunting, sportsmanship and safety may save a life, and that life may be your own. That is what County Agent Lacy Weeks said here recently. He went on and said that hunting is one of the nation's healthiest and most pleasant sports and added that if you join in the sport to remember that it pays to play safe.

According to the National Safety Council, three causes lead to almost two-thirds of the accidents during hunting season. They are human beings in line of fire, mistaking another hunter for game, and hunting with the safety catch off your gun.

The good sportman, he declared, uses common sense in handling a gun and shows consideration for others.

Southern Farm Market Summary

Hog producers rushed more hogs to market this week with resulting prices moving irregularly lower.

Cattle markets were also irregular and calves lost 50 cents to 51.

Broiler markets were also irregular during the week but at closing time were stronger as heavy supplies worked down under an improved demand.

Extremely light end-of-season tobacco sales in the Eastern Belt of North Carolina found demand also waning and grade price averages steadily losing ground.

In the 10 spot cotton markets the average price for 15-16 cotton was .094. Reported sales through last Thursday totaled 356,800 bales.

State College Answers Timely Farm Questions

Q. Are permanent plant bed sites for tobacco recommended?

A. The practice is good - but only if proper measures are taken for weed control.

Q. How should chemicals be applied to the soil?

A. Land should be thoroughly prepared and two-thirds of the chemical mixed into the top 3 or 4 inches of soil. The remaining one-third should be applied to the surface and raked lightly.

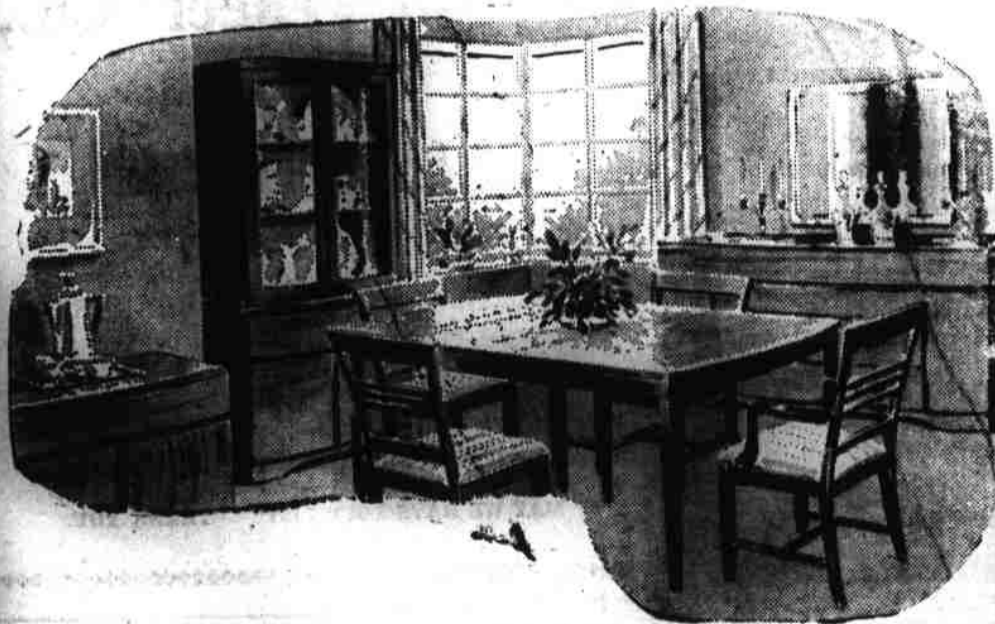
