## PTA Meets

The Warsaw PTA held their November meeting Tuesday evening of last week in the auditorium with the president Mrs. M. A. Smith, presiding. Mrs. E. Walker Stevens, program chairman, opened the meeting with the 23rd Psalm repeated in unison followed by the Lord's Prayer, after which she introduced Mr. O. P. Johnson, Supt. of County Education of Kenansville, who gave a most interesting talk on the topic "The School - Its Curriculum and Administration." He outlined his job as Duplin County School Superintendent as compared to business manager, gave an overall financial statement of the predicament of Duplin's School system, and explained tax levies and debt. Duplin County Board of Commissioners and Board of Education are upholding the "pay as we go" plan rather than to go deeper in debt thereby being forced to pay out huge amounts of interest. He explained how important it is that we, the citizens of Duplin, get behind our Congress and Legislature and demand the funds the people are entitled to. The present administration has promised help to the school system and it is up to the people to make those promises be fulfilled. Mr. Johnson described the present day as "critical" with obstacles at all corners, especially since the school fires at Beulaville and the Warsaw colored school. There are over 10,500 school children in Duplin with 330 teachers, no supervisors and no superintendents of transportation. The school principals have no clerical assistance, in fact, the system is poor administration. He went on to say that the schools needed the support of the best people and that living facilities around the schools were bad and inadequate for out of town teachers. Numbers of teachers are assisting and teaching only until new teachers can be secured. The schools need "new blood," says Mr. Johnson. Regarding the bus situation --
