Plentiful Foods

Cheese has been added to the U. S. Department of Agriculture's plentiful foods list for December. Miss Hilda Clontz, Home Agent said this week in pointing out the good buys for the month for North Carolina shoppers. In listing the plentiful foods Miss Clontz explained that before foods can qualify for the list they must be commonly used, generally available, and in plentiful supply. When a food meets these qualifications, it usually offers consumers more for their dollar than foods which are less plentiful.

State College Hints To Home Makers

Slow and steady is the rule to remember when cooking bacon and sausage for best flavor, tender texture and least waste. By keeping heat low these meat products can be cooked thoroughly without drying, hardening, or scorching.
Slow cooking has another advantage. It saves the fat in these meats from reaching the smoking point where it becomes less digestible and changes the flavor.
Cooking sausages in the oven takes longer but is convenient and economical if the oven is being used for other foods.
