Southern Farm Market Summary

Receipts of livestock tapered off last week as holidays approached and smaller supplies brought higher prices for cattle 50c to \$1.

Hog prices were mostly 50 cents higher, and top-weight butchers brought \$22 to \$22.25.

Broiler markets were irregular with practically all holiday buying completed with farm prices mostly unchanged.

Fruit and vegetable shipments were about normal. Florida citrus moved in heavy demand though it showed very little in advanced prices.

Cotton trading continued until noon Friday. The week's price changes were small. At the close, Middling 15-16 inch cotton brought an average price of 32.14 cents a pound - down 1 point.
