Southern cattle and calf marketings continued small as 1948 ended and prices were mixed.

Hog prices were strong at some plants and off at others with tops in Chicago at \$22.50

Broiler markets turned weaker with offerings ample to, but not in excess of, moderate demands.

Shipments of fresh fruits, and vegetables were light to moderate. The year's closing week saw spot cotton prices advance 75 cents a bale. Middling 15-16 inch staple was quoted at 32.20 cents a pound.

SMALL FACTS OF INTEREST

A total of 2,714,000 chicks were produced by commercial hatcheries in the State during last November.

The Tar Heel sweet potato crop during the past season was the smallest since 1924.

North Carolina cotton growers produced an average of 454 pounds of lint per acre in 1948.

Farm land values are now above the peak prices of 1920 in all but 12 states. In North Carolina, current land prices are 50% higher than the top 1920 figure.

The number of milk cows on farms in November was the smallest for the month in 18 years.

Thirty-two cooperative associations for artificial breeding of dairy cattle were formed in North Carolina during 1948, bringing the total in the State to 35.
