Veterans, Note

The New York State Veterans' Bonus Bureau is being flooded with premature applications for the New York war bonus from former New York veterans who now reside in North Carolina, area veterans' agencies were notified today by Gerald E. Rowley, Director of the New York Bureau.

"I wish you would help us to get the facts to our veterans who now reside in your State." While enabling legislation has been passed to legalize bonus payments to New York veterans who now live outside New York State, this legislation is dependent upon the approval of the people at the polls next November.

"If the amendment is approved, payment to eligible veterans now in other states will begin January 1,

1950. Any applications which are filed in the meantime by such veterans are, of course, invalid and must be rejected. Yet hundreds are being received each day from veterans who are apparently misinformed."

Mr. Rowley said that veterans now residing in North Carolina may apply in 1950 for the bonus, if they meet these qualifications:

Residence in New York at the time of entry into service and for at least six months prior thereto; active duty as a member of the armed forces of the U. S. at any time during the period Dec. 7, 1941 to Sept. 2, 1945; and honorable discharge or still in service.

Bonus payments are:

\$250 for service of any duration outside the continental limits of the U. S. during the war period;

\$150 for service of more than 60 days within the continental limits during the war period;

\$250 for service of 60 days or less within the continental limits during the war period.

Facts About The Great Smokies

Area, 461,000 acres; divided between North Carolina and Tennessee.

Length, 54 miles; width, 19 miles. Thirty-six miles over 5,000 feet high; 16 peaks over 6,000 feet high; highest peak, Clingman's Dome, 6,642 feet.

The Smokies comprise the greatest mass of upland east of the Black Hills.

They contain 130 species of native trees, 1,300 flowering plants, and over 3,600 plants of all kinds, more variety of plant life than any similar area in the American temperate zone.

Forests include giant chestnut, red maple, buckeye, cherry, silver-bell, hemlock, spruce, yellow birch, tulip poplar, etc.

Wildlife include deer, bear and many smaller furred animals. Over

200 kinds of birds have been identified.

Smokies originally owned by the Cherokee Indians, who now live on reservation on North Carolina border of Park.

Name of the mountains derived from a deep blue haze prevalent over area.

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Use Right Size Roofing Nails

Roofing nails which penetrate all the way through the boards of the roof deck can be a distinct moisture hazard even though water does not enter through the nail holes.

Points of the nails projecting into the attic usually will be the same temperature as the nail heads outside. Sometimes during the winter, the temperature of the nail points will be lower than the temperature of the attic.

The nail points can collect frost on cold nights. The warmth of the following day will change the frost to water which can seep into the ceilings and walls of the house, cracking plaster and staining wallpaper and paint.

A remedy for this condition is to ventilate the attic so that outside and inside temperatures will be more nearly the same.

Proper length nails are considered essential to correct application of fire-resistant asphalt roofing, and correct application is necessary if the roofing material is to give the full service of which it is capable.

Nails should be long enough to penetrate at least 1/4 inch into the deck lumber. Asphalt shingles frequently are used for reroofing without removing the old roofing material and in this case, of course, nails must be longer than those used in building a completely new roof.
