NEW YORK—A bill, authorizing the issue of a special commemorative stamp in honor of 160 years of cotton textile manufacturing in the United States, has been introduced in Congress by minority leader Joseph W. Martin, Jr., (Mass.).

Suggested as a possible design for the stamp is the old Slater Mill at Pawtucket, R. I. Under the auspices of the Old Slater Mill Association, this building, which dates from 1783, has been maintained as a museum of the industry. Rep. Martin's bill calls for May 9th as the first day of issuance of the new stamp, this date being the first day of National Cotton Week this year.

According to history, President Washington records in his diary a visit to a cotton mill in Beverly, Mass. 160 years ago in 1789, and in that year, Samuel Slater, father of American industry, arrived in New York and established the Slater Mill at Pawtucket, R. I. in 1790. Early records also tell of two mill enterprises begun in 1789, one near "rateburg, S. C. where an at-
