## Pvt. Davenport Is Buried In County

Services for Pfc. W. Robert Davenport, 21, killed in an accident in

China September 16, 1945, were held Tuesday at 3 p.m. at the grave side in the family cemetery, this county with the Rev. S. C. Davis officiating. Full military honors were accorded. Pfc. Davenport was born in Duplin County. Surviving are one daughter, Mary Grace; his mother, Mrs. Mary Jane Davenport of Seymour Johnson Homes; one sister, Mrs. Bessie Burvin of Holly Ridge; four brothers, Johnnie of Rt. 2, Warsaw, William A. of the Army, Charles and Wayne of the home.
