Cotton, Wheat Acreage Allotment Likely In 1950 Joe E. Sloan Says

Due to the relatively large supplies of wheat and cotton now on hand, it is very likely that acreage allotments and marketing quotas may be in effect on these crops for 1950, states Joe E. Sloan, Chairman of the Duplin County A. C. A. In order that we may assemble sufficient information to put this program in effect, it is necessary that we secure the production history for all crops for the years 1941, 1945, 1947, 1948, and 1949. It is necessary in order that we may comply with the provisions of Public Law 12, says Sloan. Committee meetings are being held for the next two weeks to receive this information from the cotton and wheat farmers and Mr. Sloan would like to urge all farmers to cooperate in meeting the committee and giving them this information, as it will assist greatly in successful completion of the work.

AN ORDINANCE AUTHORIZING \$25,000 WATER BONDS

BETTER ORDAINED by the Board of Commissioners of the Town of Faison:

Section 1. That pursuant to the Municipal Finance Act, 1921, as amended, bonds of the Town of Faison shall be issued in an aggregate principal amount not exceeding \$25,000 for the purpose of enlarging the water works system of said Town, including the construction and installation of water meter system and chlorinator.

Section 2. That a tax of five cents on all taxable property in said Town shall be annually levied and collected.

Section 3. That a statement of the debt of the Town has been filed with the clerk and is open to public inspection.

Section 4. That this ordinance shall take effect when approved by the voters of the Town at an election as provided by law.

The foregoing ordinance was passed on the 21st day of March, 1949 and was first published on the 22nd day of April, 1949.

Any action or proceeding questioning the validity of said ordinance must be commenced within thirty days after its first publication.
