10% Upswing in Tourist Traffic Seen This Year



RALEIGH—Approximately 10 per cent more tourists will enter North Carolina this year than in 1948, a survey of the latest seasonal trends by the International Geneva Association, world wide hotel employees' organization, discloses. While an infantile paralysis scare somewhat dampened last year's tourist business in the state, the North Carolina News Bureau predicted that the 1949 influx of vacation-visitors will be appreciably greater than either the 1948 or 1947 summer traffic.

Among 1,046 North Carolina resorts and inns which Frank A. Ludwig, I.G.A. executive, said were covered in the survey, only 29 plan on increasing prices this year and three will lower prices. Visitors will find some quality liquors lower priced, according to Robert Edwards, state manager of the Gibson Distilling Company, who said Gibson's Selected 8 whiskey now retails for \$3.40 per four-fifths quart compared with \$3.70 formerly.

The survey indicates that while railroad fares will remain at last year's levels, some air

lines are planning special family rates. Prices of luggage and sports equipment have eased but gasoline costs one cent more per gallon.

North Carolina's newest tourist attraction is the recently opened Hiwassee State Park near Murphy. Several more recreation areas were opened last year along the Blue Ridge Parkway. A new road from Nag's Head to Virginia Beach may be completed in time for use during the 1949 vacation season.

The Lost Colony show at Manteo, dramatizing the adventures of Virginia Dare, the first child of English parents born in the new world, will be revived in July.
