University Of N. C. Featured In Nat'l Magazine

The University of North Caro-lina's featured in the June issue of HOLIDAY as the institution which has earned Chapel Hill the label "Capital of the Southern Mind."

A 4800-word article, written by Jonathan Daniels, describes the University as "a place with an ardor for romance and for reform." Even during Civil War days, says Holiday, the University's combination of "high ideas and hilarity" brought it next-to-largest student enrollment in the country.

The article points out that the University's purpose is people and not merely students.

Of Chapel Hill, the article says: "It is indeed, almost the perfect college village in the sentimental tradition of alumni memory in America. College villages, outside of novels and plays, have a way of getting bigger and bigger as education gets higher and higher. Yet to a remarkable degree, Chapel Hill has escaped the surface damages to the returning old grad's nostalgic exectations."
