Summer Best For Repairs

Summer is the best time of year for home repair and remodeling as well as new construction. The warm weather generally makes work to be done more conveniently than at any other time. This new cook book contains many recipes that can be used with quick-frozen fish. One recipe is: Fish Baked with Cucumbers. 2 lbs. quick-frozen fillets of cod, 1 small onion, minced, 1/2 cup chicken broth, 2 cucumbers, cubed, 1/2 teaspoon dill, 1 salt and pepper, 1 stuffed olives, chopped. Wipe fillets with damp cloth. Peel and mince onion; cube cucumbers; chop olives. Place fillets in shallow fireproof baking dish; sprinkle lightly with salt and pepper to taste; cover with onion and cucumbers; sprinkle with dill; pour chicken broth over top. Bake in preheated oven 20-25 minutes. One recipe is: Wound Scratches. A small ball, applied with a small brush, will draw out the pus from a wound.
