DRAWAL OF \$3,853 FROM THE CAPITAL RESERVE FUND OF THE COUNTY OF DUPLIN

BE IT ORDERED by the Board of Commissioners of the County of Duplin, North Carolina:

Section 1. That pursuant to the County Capital Reserve Act of 19-43 withdrawal of the sum of \$3,853 from the capital reserve fund of the County of Duplin is hereby authorized for the purpose of erecting a gymnasium in the Kenansville White School. Section 2. That the source of mo-

ney in said capital reserve fund from which the withdrawal herein authorized is to be made is proceeds from insurance collected by reason of loss of property of the County Board of Education (Keansville School Gymnasium).

Section 3. That this order shall take effect 30 days after its first publication unless in the meantime a petition for its submission to the voters is filed under said County Capital Reserve Act, and in such event it shall take effect when approved by the voters of the County
