Hello Bob. Three months ago, today, I was in Kenansville, N. C. Today I'm in Tokyo, Japan.

After leaving Ft. Monmouth, N. we came to Kenansville. From Kenansville we went south to Alabama; west to Oklahoma; north to Denver, Colorado; back south again to Arizona; west to San Diego. Calif. and finally north to Sen Francisco, Calif. A trip of 5.400 miles. I had Claudine. Donna Lou-ise and "Mother Lee" (Claudine's mother) with me for the trip across the "Good Old USA" and it was a nice trip even though we ran into a couple of snowstorms. No car trouble what-so-ever

On Wednesday, 13 April 1946, I ieft San Francisco headed for Yokohama, Japan. Claudine. Donno Louise and Mother Lee remained in San Francisco I arrived in Yokohama Apr. 1 28th.
