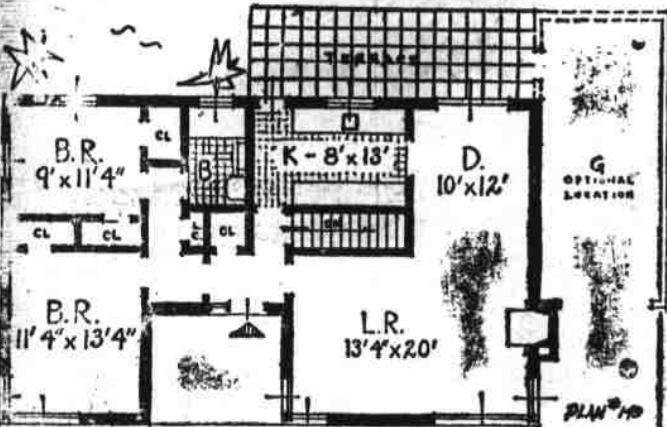
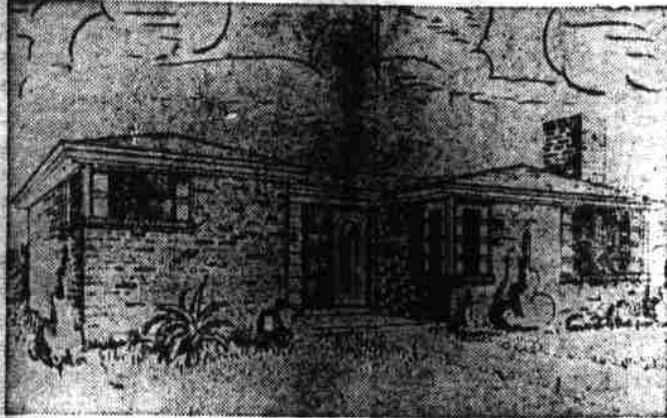

## Brick House Popular



A brick house continues to be the favorite of thousands of American families. This example was designed by J. Richard Ross, 714 Mill Street, Pittsburgh 21, as his Plan No. 149.

An advantageous feature of the planning is the ease of accessibility from one part of the house to another and from either of the entrances to any of the rooms. It is not necessary to walk through any room to get from either the front door or the back door to the living room, the bedrooms, the bath or the kitchen.

Room dimensions are larger than ordinary for a moderate-priced house. The corner windows and picture windows create a feeling of additional spaciousness.

Sidewalls are of brick veneer accented by touches of white clapboards and glass block near the front entrance. The designer recommends fire-resistant asphalt roof shingles in a harmonizing color. Deep green or blue-black shingles are suggested. Trim would be white.

Preliminary cost estimates could be based on 1,200 square feet of floor space and 16,000 cubic foot content.

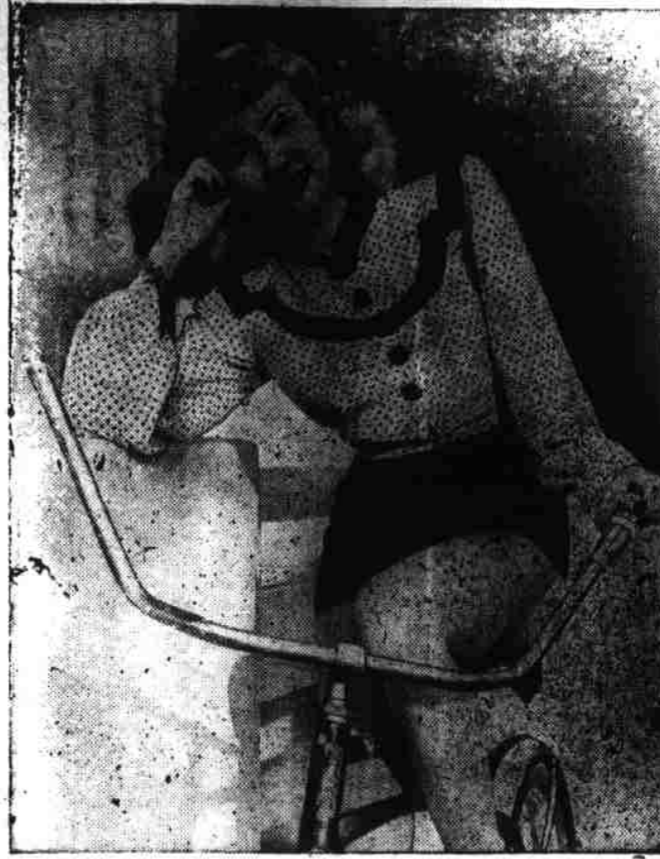

## Blouse Refresher

A simple trick to prolong the life of your silk and rayon blouses depends upon a band of grosgrain ribbon. Constant laundering, and the bang of a hot iron against the buttons, makes the fastening edge look limp and shabby in a short time. Audrey Totter, costarring in RKO Radio's "The Set-Up," suggests sewing a band of grosgrain ribbon in a line directly under the buttons. (Wash the ribbon first to prevent uneven shrinkage and make sure of elastic fastness.) Buttons will never tear off, and your blouse will keep its crisp and new look indefinitely.

## SUMMER IS SWIM-SUIT TIME



The season's swimsuits are uncluttered without being stark, figure-flattering without being fussy—designed for a combination of glamour and sea weatheriness with a Victorian shadings. The halter one-piece is varied and colorful, there's the belted, strapless type, the one-piece with the buttoned type, the bra-type which hooks in front. Shorts are sometimes substituted as to length, with vertical pleatings at the side seams (like old time corsets) so you can pull them up high or lengthen to just above the knees. Without exception, halter suits are packable, fast-drying and frankly pretty. Fabrics range from striped elasticized nylon to newest of all—cortwoy.
