Mrs. A. B. Bains is improving after a two weeks illness.

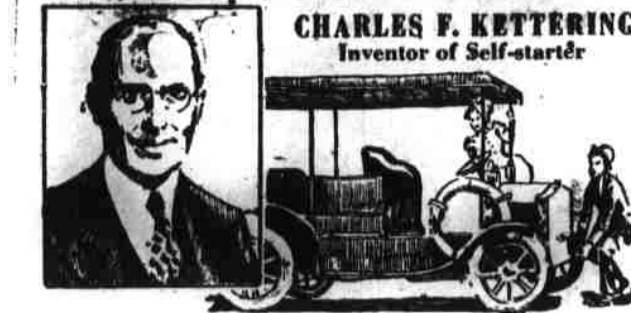

Coroner C. B. Stiterson was called to the home soon after the body was found and ruled death as suicide. No inquest was deemed necessary.

He was a lifelong member of the Mount Zion Presbyterian Church and an Elder for many years. In his more active days he was a popular fox hunter in Duplin.

Funeral services were conducted from the home Monday at 1 p.m. by Rev. F. M. Bain, Rose Hill Presbyterian minister. Burial was in the McMillan Cemetery near the home.
