Bounce and Beauty Offered In New "Dated" Tumblers



"Bounce" tumblers now carry the date of manufacture as a means of checking their durability. The "9" at left indicates 1949, the "3" signifies the glass was made in the third quarter.

Heat-Treated water tumblers are now offered in gay colors—yellow, red, or green combined with white. The designs, applied by special process, will not wear or wash off.

Many household utensils and table accessories are constantly being improved to withstand hard day-to-day usage. Look for them when you shop; their durability spells pocketbook economy.

For example, drinking tumblers are being offered that will outlast ordinary ones three to five times. Heat-Treated "bounce" tumblers will stand up under rough treatment, can be plunged from cold into hot water without damage, and have a safeguard of hardened glass that is guaranteed against chipping.

To prove their durability, the maker etches the date of manufacture on the bottom of each glass. Thus the housewife can determine just how much service she is getting from these long-lived glasses. Another feature came about because so many women asked for it. Permanent decorations in gay kitchen colors—they won't wash or wear off—are now being applied to the "bounce" water tumbler. The design is "Lucky Clover," offering shamrocks in red, yellow, or green combined with white. The pattern is appropriate for kitchen, bathroom, porch, and playroom—areas where glasses get hard usage. The decorated nine-ounce water glasses also have corrugated sides to provide a firm grip—an added safety factor in homes where there are children.

W.P.T.F. Now Broadcasts F. M.

Radio Station W.P.T.F., Raleigh, is now broadcasting on FM, it was announced this week. The station is using the facilities of a new mammoth transmitting tower just completed on a site near Cary, N. C. The FM transmitter operates on a frequency of 94.5 megacycles with an effective radiated power of 15,000 watts.

W.P.T.F.'s AM programs will continue to be heard at 680 kilocycles. The same programs will be heard on the FM band. According to General Manager R. H. Mason, the chief purpose of this duplication is to give listeners in the West and Northeast better programs through out the entire broadcast day.
