## Beulaville Has Interesting Window Display Of Old Relics, Papers, Etc.

If you are driving down Beulaville way stop by and look at the window of James Miller's Hardware Store. James has collected some very interesting old pieces. Also inside the store, and he wants to get you inside, (a free plug for him) you will find displayed under glass on one of the counters some interesting papers and documents as well as pictures of Beulaville in former days. Among them you can read a land grant written in March 1734, a paper recorded in 1744, pictures of the old Kinston and Carolina railroad depot at Beulaville and other scenes.

In the window is found a coffee and mortar pestle over 100 years old, an old melon used in Grove Church in Kenansville before the Civil War, coffee mill, copies of the World Globe published in 1844, stocking gourd grown in Duplin over 100 years ago, hand operated sewing machine, perfect Indian arrowhead specimens, an old Bible recording the birth of John Dobson in 1805 and births of other members of the family, a home-made plane, bills of sale for slaves and other interesting things including clothing, pottery, china, silverware, guns, etc.
