A Student Forum for Safety will be sponsored by the Highway Safe-ty Division in cooperation with the American Mutual Liability Insurance Co., donors of the scholarship and of advertising and radio time. Second place winner will receive \$500 scholarship.

Students entering the contest will first fill out a safety questionnaire and will submit an essay of 200 words or less on the phase of safety they consider most important. The essays and questionnaires must be mailed to the Highway Safety Division by midnight, Oct. 10.

A total of 180 students will be chosen from these entries to appear on radio programs originating from WBIG, Greensboro; WBT, Charlotte; and WPTF, Raleigh. These programs will run for 13 Sunday afternoons, beginning on Nov. 6, and sponsored by American Mutual. Through a series of eliminations final winners will be cho-

sen from this group. Essays submitted in the eliminadingtion contest will be judged by five out standing safety specialists and the radio forums will be judged by other prominent North Carolinians.
