State College Answers Timely Farm Questions

Q. Some kind of insect is eating holes in the corn I have in storage. What can I do to stop them?
A. If you plan to feed the grain, use a fumigant. Mix three parts ethylene dichloride with one part carbon disulfide and four parts carbon tetrachloride. Use this mixture as a spray or sprinkle it over the surface of the grain. Then close the storage bin up tight for 24 to 36 hours. For further details write State College for a copy of Extension Circular No. 325.

Q. How can I prevent wooden strigiers and floor joists in my buildings from rotting out?
A. The best way to prevent decay in lumber is to keep the wood dry. Under buildings where there is not enough ventilation, roll out heavy roofing on the soil. If you cover all the surface, it will keep down sweating. Where timber is to come in contact with the ground, it's always a good idea to treat the wood with a preservative.

Duplin Farmers Plant Fish

Warren W. Maxwell of the B. F. Grady section received 8000 minnows recently from the Conservation Service Nursery at Edenton. He placed them in a private pond. Fertilized water will permit the broam to grow into large size fish more rapidly, he said.
