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## Jehovah's Witnesses Will Draw Many

Several delegates from Kenansville and vicinity will be attending the three-day semi-annual convention of Jehovah's witnesses, December 16-18, in Greenville, N. C. The convention will be held in the Greenville High School Auditorium, and more than 500 delegates from 23 congregations of Jehovah's witnesses in Eastern North Carolina, circuit number one, will attend. Friday evening's program will begin at 7 o'clock with songs. Mr. D. E. Stull, ordained minister, from Brooklyn, N. Y., will then deliver the opening address to the assembled delegates. The chairman of the service meeting, Mr. G. D. Miller, will next introduce the subjects and speakers of the variety program dealing with service to Jehovah. One of the subjects to be discussed is "Profitable Expansion" by J. F. Cochran of Magnolia. At 8:30 P. M. the Theocratic Ministry School will be directed by D. E. Stull, graduates of the Watchtower College of Gilead, South Lansing, N. Y. Saturday's program will open at 9:00 A. M. by A. S. Haguna of Pottsville, Pa. A symposium of three subjects dealing with the theme "Pleasing God" will be delivered at 1:30 P. M. At 7:00 P. M. Songs and experiences will be directed by F. W. Wilson of Magnolia, and the "Circuit Activity Meeting" to follow by D. E. Stull. A fifteen minute radio program will explain the work of Jehovah's witnesses over station WGTC, 1490

kc, Saturday morning, 10:15 to 10:30. Sunday morning at 9:00 o'clock, D. E. Stull will deliver the discourse on "Baptism"; and this will be followed by a talk "Offering Men the Message of Life". The main discourse of the convention will be at 3:00 P. M., when D. E. Stull will deliver the widely advertised free public lecture, "Liberty to the Captives". Three half-hour discourses will climax the convention Sunday evening by F. A. Julian, minister from the Greenville congregation; G. D. Miller, and D. E. Stull, both of Brooklyn, N. Y.
