DUPLIN BABY CLINIC Health

For Babies

It was just two years ago that Mrs. Mary Bowden, nurse with the Duplin county Health Department, prevailed upon three of her friends to turn out for a baby clinic at Wallace.

The clinic was more of an idea than anything else at that time. But Mrs. Bowden, along with Duplin County's health officer, Dr. G .V. Gooding, felt the clinic was needed Of that first clinic, Mrs. Bowden says, "I just couldn't bear the thought of holding it without anyone present and we didn't know how the idea would take. So I prevailed upon three of my friends, Mrs. Richard Watson, Mrs. Joe Bland and Mrs. William Bryce 13

The idea wasn't wasted. On Tuesday, the 13th of last month Dr. Gooding, with his staff of nurses, again held their monthly "wellbaby" clinic, now four in number. A total of 151 babies were examined and given treatment.

Mothers, who once attend the clinics, return periodically. They realize their inestimable value. And they are free of charge. Aside from the usual, yet complete, medical examination, the bables are weighed, receive necessary shots for dyptheria, whooping cough, small pox and tetanus injections. A month's supply of cod liver oil is given to

each mother for her children.

As Dr. Gooding and his staff make their rounds, temporary examining rooms are set up in unusual. On this particular Tuesday the city hall at Wallace suddenly took on the look of a doctor's office as desks were pushed aside and white covers placed over all. At
