Father Joe Lauro of Harrison, Arkansas—he was "Big Joe" when he flew 35 missions for the Army Air Force—today knows what it is to live in pain—with constant, unrelenting headaches.

But hidden pain and hidden hurt haven't stopped the 6 foot, 2 inch former pilot from his mission of peace.

Because of his ability to overcome serious handicaps caused by World War II service and become self-sustaining the Disabled American Veterans have selected Father Lauro as "The Hero of the Month."

The selection is part of a national program to honor each month a seriously disabled veteran who has successfully rehabilitated himself.

Joe Lauro, studying at De Paul University in Chicago, answered the call to arms even before the United States entered World War II. A full year before Pearl Harbor he enlisted in the Royal Air Force and served under the Eng-

lish flag for three years on a flying bomber taking part in 68 operations over England and Africa.

For heroic flying missions he received medals at Buckingham Palace from the King and Queen of England. In 1945, Joe Lauro joined the American forces and took part in 34 bomber operations.

He was hospitalized following a crash landing and he also suffered flak injury.

The man who holds the Distinguished Flying Cross and the 27 Medal with Oak Leaf Clusters—in addition to the British award—became the first ex-G. I. to be ordained into the priesthood.

Father Lauro is 33 years old and was born in Chicago.

Today he is the Chaplain of the Disabled American Veterans Chapter No. 7 in Little Rock. He devoted to the cause of the disabled veteran.

Father Lauro's creed? It's simply: "I am here doing God's work, not because my pilot ability brought us through combat, but because God saw fit to hear our prayers and He was our First Pilot on all our missions. Those bombing missions are over, now the big mission of doing God's work on the Mission of Arkansas are mine."
