(CONTINUED FROM FRONT) cial insemination and the arrival of several hundred superior calves in this section has justified the confidence of the founders of the movement.

Realizing the value of such a project, a number of businessmen cooperated in the founding of the project by purchasing preferred stock and in other ways giving assistance to the venture. Among those participating in its early development were Roy Carter, Harry Kramer, A. J. Cavanaugh, E. C. Sanderson, Dr. D. Hundley, Wallace Drug Company. The Duplin Times devoted valuable support in the way of publicity.

Shortly after the association began operations, Donald Buckner was secured as technician. Following training in this field at State College, he began work as an inseminator. Much of the success the organization has enjoyed has been due to his efficient and tireless effort. The latest figures from the National Office in Chicago show Mr. Buckner's conception rate per first service at 73% which is one of the highest in the nation. An average of 52% is considered good.

Mr. J. F. Brown, State College Extension agent, will be present to show films on artificial insemination and discuss the program with the members.

Record Breaking Construction Planned

On Jan. 1, 1950 North Carolina moved into the second half of the 20th Century — and what undoubtedly will be its greatest year of roadbuilding.

With \$ 70,000,000 annual income augmented by \$200,000,000, the State Highway Commission expects to finish more miles of primary and secondary roads during 1950 than in any one year of its history.

January contracting projects will break all-time records of the Commission. Some 384 miles of roads are being placed under contract covering work in 36 counties. Thirty five of 48 projects represent bond money roads. Division commissioners promise the same volume of work for the early months of spring.

Long-range planning, started last June, began to show up in work schedule for January. Dr. H. W. Jordan, Commission chairman, reiterated his previous warning that private contractors would find it difficult to absorb all the work planned for their forces — if prices remain in line.

The Commission's ten new highway division chiefs plunged into their planning program immediately after the June 4 bond election. By the end of the summer they had laid the foundation for an ambitious four-year program — the results of which are now beginning to be seen in every part of North Carolina.

404,598 AGING HOMES IN STATE HAVE HIGH I. Q.

North Carolina has 404,598 houses that are at least 30 years old and are beginning to suffer from the infirmities of old age, but present-day wonders of "rejuvenation" could improve many of them so they would represent better values by \$3,000 to \$4,000 than comparable new homes bought on today's market.

Real estate operators interviewed estimated that, generally speaking, it would cost \$4,000 to \$5,000 to give an old house a new look, but that the increased value would justify the expenditure.
