Soul Stirring Film Found In "Golgotha"

The story of "Golgotha" French film showing at the Capital Sunday and Monday was first presented in and around Jerusalem nearly 2000 years ago. That original presentation, with its divinely inspired cast, can never be duplicated, but French director Julien Duvivier has taken a group of little-known actors, plus hundreds of extras, and created a magnificent re-enactment of the great Christian drama.

"Golgotha" is the story of the last days of Christ, told with simplicity, power and realism. Scenes portrayed are Christ's triumphal entry into Jerusalem; the driving of the money-changers from the Temple; the fears of the high priests; the betrayal of Judas; the Last Supper; the agony in Gethsemane; the trials before the high priests, Pilate and Herod; the scourging; the journey to Calvary; the

Crucifixion; and the Resurrection. The part of Christ, played by an actor deliberately chosen for his obscurity so the audience's conception of the Saviour would not be confused with some well-known actor's personality, is portrayed with simple dignity, powerful in its conception.

The mob scenes, including dramatic closeups of individuals as they thunder "Crucify Him" are both terrible and soul-shaking in dramatic realism.

The film is not a new one. It is somewhat frayed and faded in parts. But this detracts little from the greatness of the production. A full English dialogue has been dubbed in, so skillfully that its just barely noticeable that the film wasn't originally made in English. The Capital has a show worth seeing by every man, woman and child.

DUPLIN T. B. ASSO.

(CONTINUED FROM FRONT) but stated they were failing to interest the citizens of Duplin in TB control to the extent that our annual Christmas Seal sales do not measure up to the average for the State. Duplin Seal sales average only 4 cents per capita, while the average is 10 cents.

He stated that during 1950 many more beds would be added for sanatoria care of TB patients in the state, and that the time is not far off when a patient can be hospitalized in a state sanatorium within 24 hours after being diagnosed a TB victim. Mr. Webster stressed the fact that our Board members should be civic-minded persons who are interested in TB control and that the Board be enlarged to include representatives from every community in Duplin. In conclusion he stated that a well-rounded TB program should include increasing the public interest in TB control through health education, case finding, adequate treatment and rehabilitation.

How Your TB Dollar Was Spent
Twenty cents out of every dollar collected through the Seal Sale drive is sent to the N. C. TB Association, and 80 cents of it stays in the county. This money is used to operate the Duplin County Tuberculosis Association.

Report of 1949 Seal Sale
Dr. H. W. Colwell of Wallace, Chairman of the 1949 Seal Sale, gave the following report:

Gross Receipts: From Sale of Seals (White pop.) \$1,239.46; From Sale of Seals (Negro) \$460.59; Total \$1,700.05. 20% to N. C. T. A. \$340.01; Balance for 1950-51 Budget \$1,360.04; Usable Fund for 1950-51 Budget \$1,608.58

What Your TB Money is Doing
Mrs. Kornegay, Ex. Sec'y, and who is also serving as TB Worker in the Health Dept. gave a report of the year's work. She keeps a case register of all patients with TB and all contacts. The patients and contacts are followed by the staff. At present there are 16 persons from Duplin in the sanatorium undergoing treatment, 5 veterans from the County in VA hospitals for TB, and 9 are being treated in their homes. During the year 6 died from TB in the county. 1244 x-rays were made at the Health Department and approximately 500 TB house visits were made. The association sponsored health talks, movies on TB, posters and newspaper articles to disseminate knowledge concerning the cause, treatment and prevention of TB.

Dr. Ewers named the following members to serve on the Nominating Committee for officers for the coming year: Dr. H. W. Colwell, Mr. George Bennett, and Mrs. N. B. Boney. A meeting was set for June, date to be announced later, at which time the new officers will be installed and the budget for the new year set up.

Before adjourning Mr. E. C. Thompson asked for time to express his great appreciation for the progress of the TB program since the organization of the Association 3 years ago, and asked for a rising

vote of thanks to the Executive Secretary (Mrs. Kornegay) for her untiring efforts in promoting the activities of the Association. Edwin P. Ewers, Pres. Duplin County T. B. Association.

2. 10% of farm income is from livestock and livestock products.
3. 81% is produced on 17% of our cropland, or 83 % of our land is producing only 19% of our income.

4. Practically all of the crop which now produce 90% of our income is now under quotas.

5. 53% of the 5654 farms are operated by tenants.

6. The 5654 farms average 24.5 acres of cropland.

7. Corn is grown on 69,000 acres of our 135,000 acres of cropland.

8. Value of all products sold average \$1986 per farm.

Many more interesting facts were revealed during the study. Following this study a suggested

Long Range Agricultural Program, designed to increase farm incomes, was adopted at a meeting of farmers, civic leaders, businessmen and agricultural workers sponsored by Duplin County Farm Bureau.

With a good feed production program, it is believed that livestock offers the most feasible way of increasing the average farm income. The Long Range Program committee recommends that each farmer carefully study his own situation to see if one or more livestock enterprises will increase his income. Hogs, beef cattle, dairy cattle and poultry are well adapted to this area.

Commodity committees of farm people have been set up on all crops and livestock produced in the county. These committees will further study the possibilities of their enterprise and make recommendations as to how it may best fit into a Long Range Program.

These committees are now at work, holding meetings and discussing their phase of the Long Range Program with their neighbors. The Acting Steering Committee of the Duplin County Long
