Chicken Contest Plans Announced

Some 3,000 chicks hatched during the week March 6-11 will be entered in this year's "Chicken of Tomorrow" contest in North Carolina, according to C. J. Maupin, State chairman and extension poultry specialist at State College.

State contests are being held all over the nation this year, and these are to be followed by five regional contests. The best entries from

North and South Carolina and other Southern States in an area extending from Delaware to Florida will compete in a regional contest at Spartanburg, S. C., on June 7.

A national contest will be held in 1951, at which time A & P Food Stores will award \$5,000 for the best entry. This organization is also providing cash awards for the regional contests and furnishing a trophy for each State winner.

Birds from each entry in the N. C. contest will be sent to Charlotte at the end of a 12-week growing period. These birds will be dressed and judged on May 30, and the winning entries will be hard-frozen and held until time to ship to the regional event.

Maupin said a special poultry program is being arranged in connection with the show in Charlotte. George Hobson, Mecklenburg County farm agent, is acting as chairman of the program committee and Miss Helen John Wright, home demonstration agent, is publicity chairman.

Miller Club History

On March 3, 1933, Mrs. Pratt C. McSwain gave a demonstration on meat canning in the home of Mrs. J. L. Miller. Several women were there and became so interested in club work that in April a meeting was held in the home of Mrs. Ralph Miller where officers were elected and the Miller Club duly organized. Membership quickly grew to the number of 30 and kept increasing until the Miller Club divided into the Miller and Cabin Clubs. Present enrollment is no 25.

Outstanding leaders have led the club well. A list of presidents and years served follows:

In local work, many worthwhile enterprises have been carried on. Wreaths have always been bought for deceased members. Dress reviews have been held with much interest shown. Each summer a recreation program has been had

with the families of members invited.

Usually a dinner or something special has been enjoyed at Christmas. During the war several bonds were bought and are still the property of the club.

In county contests, the Miller Club has often shown its merit. In 1934 Mrs. Ashe Miller won a prize in home improvements and yard beautification. A garden contest was held in 1938, Mrs. J. L. Miller won second place and Mrs. Willie Mercer won fourth. At the Spring Federation in 1937, the club won third prize in a song contest. Also in that year, Miss Ernie Sanderson won a prize in a kitchen contest. Mrs. James Miller won first prize of \$25 in a yard beautification contest in 1939. Mrs. Andrew Miller won third prize in the same contest. The steam pressure cooker was won several times for best attendance at the Federation Meetings.

Now, as in the past, the members are striving to improve living conditions along all the lines recommended by Home Demonstration Leaders.

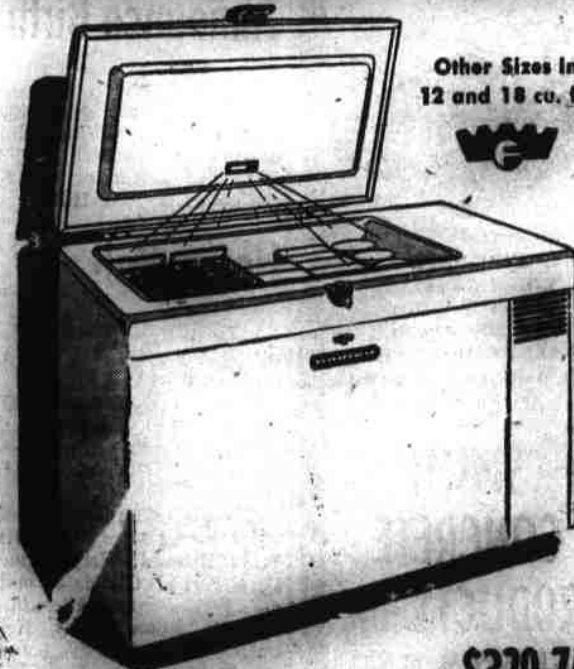
