**Chicken Contest Plans Announced** 

Some 3,000 chicks hatched during the week March 6-11 will be entered in this year's "Chicken of Tomorrow" contest in North Carolina, according to C. J. Maupin, State chairman and extension poultry specialist at State College.

State contests are being held all over the nation this year, and these are to be followed by five regional contests. The best entries from

North and South Carolina and other Southern States in an area extending from Delaware to Florida will compete in a regional contest at Spartanburg, S. C., on June 7.

A national contest will be held in 1951, at which time A & P Food Stores will award \$5,000 for the best entry. This organization is also providing cash awards for the regional contests and furnishing a trophy for each State winner. Birds from each entry in the N.

C. contest will be sent to Charlotte at the end of a 12-week growing period. These birds will be dressed and judged on May 30, and the winning entries will be hard-frozen and heid until time to ship to the regional event.
