New York City, June 8. — Miss Margaret Ray Peirce, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. John Miller Peirce of Warsaw, N. C., became the bride of Gordon Richards Robotham, son of Mr. and Mrs. E. W. Robotham, of Westport, Conn., on Saturday afternoon, May 27, at Christ Church in New York City. Dr. Ralph W. Sockman officiated.

In the beautiful small chapel of the church, white snapdragons and stock, sprays of pink and white lilac, white tulips and gladioli, flanked by lighted torchiers, entwined with ivy, adorned the chancel and altar before which the vows were spoken.

A program of organ music was presented before the ceremony, including, "Souvenir", (Drida), McDowell's "To A Wild Rose", the "Meditation", from "Thais", and "O Promise Me". The "Wedding March", from the third act of "Lohengrin" (Wagner), was played for the processional and Mendelssohn's March from "A Midsummer Night's Dream", for the recessional. During the ceremony, the lyric strains of Liszt's "Liebestraum", were heard in the background.

The bride was attired in a bouffant white Swiss organdy dress over taffeta, with square-cut neckline and puffed elbow-length sleeves. A note of color was added with the heavenly blue sash and repeated in the delicate embroidery on her short white gloves. Her finger-tip veil was caught by a coronet of daisies and she carried an old-fashioned nosegay bouquet, in the center of which were several very white orchids, showered with valley lillies.

Her maid of honor, and only attendant, was her sister, Miss Sallie Faison Peirce, who wore a similar dress of organdy, in heavenly blue over taffeta. She wore matching mitts and a headdress of blue organdy with a brief plaited veil caught at either side with daisies. She carried a bouquet of daisies.
