## **Holiday Wrecks Analysis Given**

Raleigh - An analysis of the 14 aecidents in which 23 persons were killed over the Fourth of July week end revealed eight causes for the mishaps, the Department of Motor Vehicles reported today.

They were: speeding, careless and reckless driving, driving on the wrong side of the road, driving under the influence of intoxicants, walking under the influence of intoxicants, walking carelessly, mechanical failure and hit and run.

No accidents occurred on July 4 itself. Twenty persons were kill-ed in the first two and one-half days of the holiday and three died on July 3, one of the of earlier in-Four accidents occurred during daylight hours and 10 at night. None of the accidents could be attributed to weather conditions. Despite the concentration of vehicles in resort areas, no fatal accident occurred farther east than
