- 3/8 teaspoon pepper
- 6 hamburger buns



Have margarine at room temperature. Combine with blue cheese, Worcestershire Sauce and onion juice, blending thoroughly. Mix together beef, one tablespoon margarine, bread

crumbs, milk, egg, salt and pepper. Saute in hot fat. Cut hamburger rolls in half and spread with blue cheese mixture. Sandwich with cooked hamburger. Serves six.

State College Answers Timely Farm Questions
Q. How can the corn earworm be controlled on sweet corn?
A. There is no known perfected control. Five per cent DDT dust applied in five to six treatments gave 86 per cent worm-free ears, but the treatment is not dependable. A check plot with no treatment yielded only 26 per cent of the ears worm-free.
Q. How should I handle market eggs during summer?
A. Eggs must be collected frequently during the day, cooled rapidly and sorted under good conditions and held at a temperature between 50 and 60 degrees with a relative humidity of about 75 per cent.
