DOG TALES

Animal Rescue Stations

ANIMAL rescue stations are being established throughout the Rocky Mountain area to take care of pets lost in the desert country. Since the first two stations were opened last spring in Arizona, the idea has spread until over fifty are expected to be in operation by the end of the year. This plan, completely new in the West, is reported in a recent issue of The National Humane Review.

In the rugged desert country, a pet lost from an automobile soon dies because of the scanty supply of food and water. So Charles McPherson, Rock Mountain regional director for The American Humane Association, set up the plan for first-aid rescue stations. He has worked with the Texaco Oil Company in securing the cooperation of local gasoline station managers for the establishment of the rescue points.

The first Texaco dealer to set up a station was Ralph Stoughton, owner of a station in Oracle Junction, twenty-two miles from Tucson on U. S. Highway 80. A first-aid kit containing dog and cat food and emergency supplies is kept in the station. The attendant cares for lost animals until they can be turned over to the Tucson Humane Society.

The second rescue station was established nineteen miles east of Yuma, Arizona, on the same high-

way, less than a month after the first. This is located at a service station owned and operated by D. C. Smith and is sponsored by the Yuma Humane Society. The Yuma Society is a new group, and the rescue station is one of its first projects.

A sign has been posted at each gas station identifying it as an "Emergency Animal Relief Station." The emergency equipment includes medical supplies, a heavy towel which may be saturated in cold water to wrap around an animal's head in case of heat prostration, pans for food and water, several cans of food, a leash and different sized collars.

The stations have letters of instruction for tourists who request information about the care of their pets in desert areas. These letters tell where they may find a veterinarian in either Yuma or Phoenix and give the addresses of the local humane societies.

Plans call for the opening of five emergency aid stations in the Tucson area alone before the summer's end. Later, the network of rescue stations will extend into New Mexico, Colorado, Wyoming, Utah and Nevada. This area, incidentally, is considered to have some of the best fed dogs in the world since weather conditions here make canned dog foods unusually popular. No left over table scraps for desert pups
