The 1950-51 goose and duck hunting season in North Carolina will open November 27 and run through January 5. Currituck, Hatteras, Ocracoke and Lake Mattamuskeet are famed hunting places along the Atlantic Flyway. The daily bag limit for geese will be two, and the possession limit two. The duck bag limits will be four a day and eight in possession.

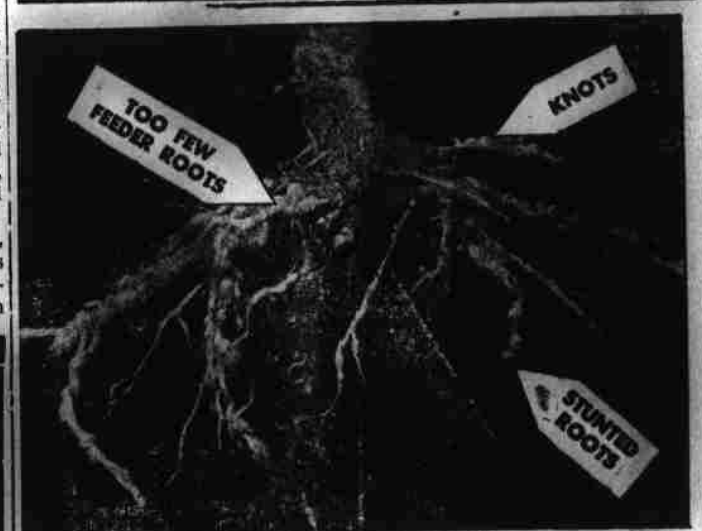
