## State College Answers Timely Farm Questions

Q. I want to use my tobacco barn for curing and storing sweet potatoes. What should I do to adapt the barn for this purpose?

A. It's neither difficult nor expensive to make the necessary changes. Just ask your county agent for a copy of Plan No. TVA.

Q. My Irish potato plants produced balls of fruit that looked like small, green tomatoes. What were they?

A. They were not tomatoes, but simply pods of potato seed. However, as far as the home gardner

is concerned, the seeds are worthless.

Q. Have scientists learned how to grow seedless watermelons?

A. Yes, but they wonder whether it's practical to do so. Due to excessive cost in production, consumer acceptance of seedless watermelons would not be great enough to make commercial growing a good venture.
