Wilkins says almost every farmer is putting in from half an acre to 20 of pasture. The large number of office callers requesting help in soil sampling indicates that an unusually large number will be using improved methods of seeding. First Negro farmer in the county to harvest a 100-bushel-per-acre corn yield this year was Aubrey Murfree of Rt. 1, Warsaw, who produced 100.5 bushels on an acre of N. C. 27 hybrid.
