Inventions that Serve You

Thomas Blanchard (1788-1864) was one of the first great American inventors. His best-known invention was a contour lathe. He astonished some of the prominent congressmen of his day by setting up his machine in the Capitol and turning out their likenesses in sculptured busts. Blanchard pioneered steam power for land and sea engines. He exhibited a steam vehicle that puffed over roads, backing and turning as desired. The first machine to make tacks automatically was his invention. In shipbuilding, he invented and patented a machine to bend timbers by steam, which brought him \$150,000. During his later years he served as an expert witness in patent cases.
